RELIGIOUS EDUCATION KEEPING THE GOSPEL ALIVE IN LENT

During Lent the church asks adults to fast, pray and give alms. Alms are gifts to the poor. Fasting means eating less than usual. Catholics over the age of 14 are asked not to eat meat on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Young people can share the spirit of fasting by giving up something they enjoy, like sweets or junk food or tv. They can do good works like offering to do extra jobs around the house or by giving part of their pocket money to people in need. These are called sacrifices. They are good deeds, done in God's name, that show our love of God and sorrow for sins.

Last Sunday was the first Sunday of Lent and traditionally the gospel always tells about the time when Jesus spent forty days fasting and being tempted in the wilderness. It begs the question : *How am I fasting this Lenten season ?*

While there is often much discussion at this time of the year as to which foods we are giving up (and rightly so), the following reflection presents a different view of fasting for Lent.

HOW TO FAST



Fast from judging others: Feast on Christ dwelling in them. Fast from apparent darkness: Feast on the reality of light.

Fast from pessimism : Feast on the reality of light. Fast from thoughts of illness: Feast on the healing power of God. Fast from words that pollute: Feast on phrases that purify. Fast from anger : Feast on patience. Fast from worry: Feast on Divine Providence. Fast from unrelenting pressure : Feast on unceasing prayer. Fast from negatives: Feast on positives. Fast from complaining: Feast on

appreciation.

Fast from hostility: Feast on nonresistance.

Fast from bitterness: Feast on forgiveness. Fast from anxiety: Feast on hope. Fast from yourself: Feast on a silent heart.

DENG FROM SOUTH SUDAN

Deng, 50 grew up with his family in Barmayen Village, South Sudan

When Deng was six, he became very ill and his right side became partially paralysed. Not letting this deter him, he happily returned to the peaceful life he knew and loved.

In 1993, civil war broke out and everything changed. Deng, his family and other villagers fled for the bush, leaving their homes behind.

"We were unable to be in our village, life was unbearable and all the time we kept hiding from the militia."

During this time Deng's eyes became infected and he lost his sight, making life even harder for him and his family.

In 2005, the civil war ended and they were able to move back home. To assist with resettling, Caritas Australia's partner, Hope Agency for Relief and Development provided Deng and his wife, Aketch with two goats, five chickens, fishing nets and a selection of seeds to plant. They are now confident of a more secure future and are happy their children can attend school.

" Thank you very much and God bless you abundantly," said Deng.

National Lament

An Overview of the Call for a National Lament Over People Seeking Asylum

"We are a society which has forgotten how to weep." - Pope Francis

Many people throughout Australia are disturbed by the punitive and harsh policies and conditions to which people seeking asylum in Australia are being subjected.

The recent incident on Manus Island and the death of one person and the injury of many highlights the lack of care and dignity in the policies of both the Government and the Opposition and the absence of awareness of their legal and moral responsibilities.

In response to the desire for prayer and action, Catholic Religious Australia is inviting you to participate in a "National Lament".

We are taking our inspiration from the words of Pope Francis when he visited Lampedusa, Italy.

The National Lament is a campaign of prayer, penance and action for people seeking asylum in Australia.

We are seeking to make a Christian response to these people, rather than treating them as a "problem" to be solved.

The National Lament will have 2 parts:

Part 1 - Engaging in prayer, penance and action for people seeking asylum in Australia by:

- making Friday in Lent a day of prayer and penance for people seeking asylum
- continuing this practice after Lent through to the Ascension
- writing to one's local Federal member and to the Minister, Scott Morrison, expressing our lament for people seeking asylum in Australia

Part 2 - Engaging in a Week of Prayer and Prophetic Presence during Ascension to Pentecost, 1 to 8 June 2014.

Participate in the National Lament using the Reflection and Prayer Sheet overleaf.
