Adam continued working on Restorative Practices with the staff and held sessions with all classes engaging in activities around anger management, ontask behavior, resilience and co-operative learning. Thank you to the eleven parents who attended Monday night's session on building a resilient child. This is a huge issue in today's modern society. Children have to learn that there are times when things won't be OK and they have to have the strategies to deal with it. We are not doing them any favours by putting bandaids on their problems all the time. Staff and parents have the opportunity to access all resources available on the Real Schools website as part of our partnership. RELIGIOUS EDUCATION NEWS



THE SEASON OF EASTER CONTINUES...

As you know Easter Sunday is not the end of the Easter season. It continues for seven weeks concluding on Pentecost Sunday – 15th May this year.

During this time (sometimes called 'Eastertide') we as Catholics are encouraged to put aside some time each day for personal prayer – to allow the message of Easter to impact on our lives.

One way to do this is to participate in 'Lectio Divina' in your own time. Advocates of this special form of prayer and scripture reading



suggest that it has many benefits. It can bring greater inner peace and calm; as well as a feeling of being more at home with yourself , with loved ones and of course with God.

SO WHAT IS LECTIO DIVINA?

"Lectio Divina" is a Latin term that basically means ' divine or sacred reading'. It describes a way of reading the scriptures whereby we gradually let of our own agenda and open ourselves to what God wants to say to us. It is an ancient form of prayer that is used by many communities of monks and religious orders, but it is useful for us as well. There are various ways to practice 'Lectio Divina' and it can be done individually or as a group. The following are the basic four stages.

- LECTIO (reading) First read the text slowly and let it sink in. At this most basic level you ask yourself: <u>What is going on in the Bible</u> <u>passage?</u> Sometimes a Bible commentary is useful to enable you to better understand the context.
- MEDITATIO (reflection) Think about the text and reflect upon it so that you can take from it what God wants to give. <u>What is God saying to me</u> <u>through this passage?</u> For example, how might what is happening apply to your life?
- ORATIO (response) Leave thinking aside and simply let your heart speak to God. <u>What do I want to say to God?</u> Use this part of prayer to express your inner feelings.

4. **CONTEMPLATIO (rest)** - Allow yourself to be still and rest for a while with God. Listen with the deepest level of your being. <u>What can you take away</u> <u>from this?</u> What you have heard may help to transform you and move you to action in your daily life.

It is important to note that these stages are not fixed and are simply guidelines as to how the prayer normally develops. It is however recommended that it be done with simplicity and a move towards less talking and more listening.

The red represents the blood of all those who gave their lives, the black represents the mourning of those who didn't have their loved ones return home, and the green leaf represents the grass and crops growing and future prosperity after the war destroyed so much. The leaf should be positioned at 11 o'clock to represent the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, the time that World War One formally ended. Women should wear their poppy on their right side.
