THE FEAST OF THE ANNUNCIATION Today, 25th March we

Today, 25th March we celebrate the feast of the Annunciation. This rather unique word simply means an announcement or

proclamation. It has special meaning though when it refers to the announcement made by the angel

Gabriel to Mary that God had chosen her to be the mother of his son.

According to Luke's gospel (1: 26-38) the angel Gabriel told Mary to name her son Jesus, which means 'saviour'.

On this day we commemorate Mary's acceptance of God's will and the conception of Christ nine months before Christmas. The annunciation, as much as or even more so than Christmas, represents Christ's Incarnation (the central mystery of Christianity that God took on human nature and became man). The narrative of the Annunciation testifies strongly to

The narrative of the Annunciation testifies strongly to the truth of the Catholic tradition that Mary played a very important role in God's plan and that together with Jesus, the privileged and graced Mary is the link between heaven and earth.

We are continually reminded of the importance of this feast to our salvation in various devotional prayers. Two examples that highlight the significance of this feast are the *joyous mysteries of the Rosary* and the *Angelus*.



DO YOU PERHAPS RECOGNIZE THE PICTURE ABOVE? HAVE YOU SEEN IT SOMEWHERE BEFORE?

It is a famous painting about a famous prayer: the Angleus. In this 19th century work by French painter Jean-Francois Millet, a farming couple prays the Angelus at dusk.

This prayer is well suited to the artist's subject matter; two humble people paying homage to our Lord and His blessed Mother in the Hail Mary together with Gospel verses which recall his Incarnation as he entered the world. Its name comes from its opening line in Latin, "Angelus Domini nuntiavit Mariae" – "The angel of the Lord declared unto Mary".

It is said that this wonderful prayer evolved from a recitation of three Hail Mary's following an evening bell around the 12th century. Many of you may remember saying the Angelus at 12 o'clock every day while attending school. Traditionally, the Angelus

was said three times daily, at 6 am, noon and 6 pm although nowadays you can pray it anytime. In a nutshell, it sums up Mary's great news! (WHEN PRAYED IN A GROUP A LEADER RECITES THE VERSES AND EVERYONE RECITES BOTH THE RESPONSES AND THE HAIL MARY'S IN BETWEEN EACH VERSE AS SHOWN BELOW.)

- V. The Angel of the Lord declared unto Mary.
- R. And she conceived of the Holy Spirit. (Pray 1st Hail Mary)
- V. Behold the handmaid of the Lord.
- R. Be it done unto me according to they Word. (Pray 2^{nd} Hail Mary)
- V. And the Word was made flesh.
- R. And dwelt among us. (Pray 3rd Hail Mary)
- V. Pray for us, O holy Mother of God.
- R. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

LET US PRAY

Pour forth, we beseech Thee, O Lord, Thy grace into our hearts, that we to whom the Incarnation of Christ Thy Son was made known by the message of an angel, may by His Passion and Cross be brought to the glory of His Resurrection. Through the same Christ Our Lord. Amen.

PROJECT COMPASSION NEWS: Week 4 MARTINA FROM THE SOLOMON ISLANDS

Martina is a teacher in the Solomon Islands. Her favourite part of the school day is teaching the children songs from Caritas Australia's Disaster Risk Management Project.

Using well-known tunes and simple lyrics, children learn what to do in the event of potential disasters that face the Solomon Islands such as cyclones, floods, earthquakes and tsunamis.

"Nursery rhymes break down the fear associated with natural disasters, and also help children memorise the rhymes and the emergency response," said Martina.

"They enjoy the singing."

Martina's school in Ngossi is in a region, much like many in the Solomon Islands and Vanuatu, that is prone to all manner of natural disasters.

Adam Elliott, Cartias Australia's Solomon Islands and Vanuatu Program Manager, said disasters often occur early in the morning when the children are at school. So it is very important for the young children to learn strategies to be safe during disasters and emergencies.

"This season we're better prepared and know how to respond, and in an emergency this can make all the difference," said Martina.
